The Department of Safety and Security

The staff of the department of safety and security consists of the director, assistant director, access control coordinator, office coordinator, four fulltime patrol officers, and student safety officers. Officers are available 365 days a year.

The department of safety and security aids in enforcement of federal, state, local statutes and university regulations. Safety and security officers are non-commissioned and are the duly constituted representatives of Southwest Baptist University. While safety and security officers do not make arrests, the department of safety and security maintains a close working relationship with local law enforcement authorities. Officers do have the right to detain and identify any individual on university property. Safety and security officers cooperate with and may request assistance from local law enforcement authorities when needed.

The department of safety and security provides for the safety and protection of students, faculty, staff, visitors, and the environment. In addition, the department is charged with protecting property, enforcing university regulations, and maintaining order. The entire staff strives to serve the university community. The department's mission is to promote an atmosphere free from fear for personal safety, property loss, or accidents and thereby contribute to SBU's academic excellence.



The Office of Campus Security became the Department of Safety and Security in 1999.

Jeanne Clery Act

The university will comply with the "Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act". Any questions related to the implementation or the compliance of this public law (34 CFR Part 668) should be directed to the vice president for administration, located in the Sells Administration Building. The vice president for administration has been designated by the university to coordinate the institution's efforts to comply with the regulations effecting the implementation of this act.

Off-campus centers will follow the same procedures unless specified.



Jeanne Clery was murdered in her dorm room on April 5, 1986 at Lehigh University.

Procedure for Preparing and Distributing the Report

The department of safety and security has been designated by the university to gather the information and statistics related to the act. The director of safety and security will oversee the preparation and distribution of the annual report. The report will include crime statistics from the previous three calendar years.

The report will be available for review on the safety and security website and the SBU Safety and Security Portal page. Students, faculty, and staff will be notified of the location of the report by email and portal announcement, the official means of communication at Southwest Baptist University.

A hard copy of the report will be available upon request at the Hammons Center. In addition, all prospective students and employees are informed about the availability of the report through a statement on the respective applications. The department of safety and security will present educational programs to aid the university community in understanding the Clery Act.

The report will be published and made available each academic year. The vice president of administration will ensure that the annual report is submitted to the Department of Education each year.

Reporting Crimes at SBU Campuses

If a student, employee, or visitor believes criminal activity has taken place on university property, the Bolivar Police Department should be contacted immediately by calling 417-326-5298. Safety and security can be contacted by calling 417-328-1556 or 417-328-8733. The department of safety and security will be notified by local law enforcement authorities of any reported criminal activity occurring on campus or in the contiguous area. Incidents of criminal activity will be posted in the daily incident log. The daily incident log is available for review at the department of safety & security during normal business hours.

If an incident occurs on the Mountain View campus it should be reported to the Mountain View Police Department at 417-934-2525. The Mountain View Police will notify the center director of any reported criminal activity occurring on campus or in the contiguous area. The daily incident log will be maintained by the center director.

If an incident occurs on the Salem campus it should be reported to the Salem Police Department at 573-729-4242. The Salem Police will notify the center director of any reported criminal activity occurring on campus or in the contiguous area. The daily incident log will be maintained by the center director.

If an incident occurs at the Springfield campus the Springfield Police Department should be notified at 417-864-1810. The center director and building coordinator will be notified by the Springfield Police and St. John's Security of any reported criminal activity occurring on campus or in the contiguous area. The daily incident log will be maintained by the center director and building coordinator.

Reporting Officials

The following positions have been designated reporting officials related to the Clery Act: president, provost, vice president for administration, dean of students, athletic director, director of admissions, director of enrollment management, director of human resources, director of safety and security, a member of the residential life staff.

On the off-campus centers the following reporting officials have been designated: center director (Mountain View); center director (Salem); center director and building coordinator (Springfield Center).

The university does not have a voluntary confidential reporting system.

Timely Warnings

If circumstances warrant, special printed crime alerts will be prepared and distributed either selectively or throughout the campus community. These are security incidents that could threaten or effect other people in the university community.



Alert bulletins may be posted on the safety and security internet site, the SBU Portal, and distributed through campus email or sent by text message through the SBU E2Campus Alert System or a combination of all the above.

Building Security

Safety and security officers monitor campus facilities on a regular basis. All administrative buildings and classrooms are secured each evening after normal business hours and after classroom instruction is completed. Entry to administrative and classroom buildings after hours require authorized key or card access, or written authorization to safety and security from the appropriate building supervisor.

The Mountain View campus is secured by the center director when the last class is finished each day. The center director is in charge of key control.

The Salem campus is secured by a staff member when the last class is finished each day. The center director is in charge of key control.

The Springfield Center is secured by the custodial staff when the last class is finished. In addition, there is an alarm system monitored by St. John's Security. The building coordinator is in charge of key control.

Residential Hall Security

The front door of each residence hall is the only access for entry or exit for visitors. All residence halls are locked 24/7.

Entry may be gained by card access or by calling safety and security 417-328-1556 or 328-8733.

The department of safety and security coordinates residential hall hours with the office of student life.

Maintenance of Buildings

Buildings are inspected on a regular basis by safety and security officers. Any security related concerns are reported to the physical plant department immediately. The grounds are maintained in a manner that will enhance the safety of the university community. It is the goal of the university to maintain a safe environment.

The center director at the Mountain View Center is responsible for coordinating the maintenance of the building and grounds.

The center director at the Salem Center is responsible for coordinating the maintenance of the building and grounds.

The maintenance of the building and grounds at the Springfield Center is the responsibility of St. John's (the owners of the facility that houses the Springfield Center).

Requests for maintenance service should be made to the physical plant at 417-328-1550.



Crime Prevention Programs and Crime Prevention Tips

Throughout the academic year the department of safety and security, student development, and other university organizations sponsor crime prevention and safety awareness programs for the university community. Some of the programs offered are personal safety and awareness, sexual assault awareness, theft prevention, and substance abuse awareness. In addition, safety and security officers will make presentations about services that the safety and security department offers. Officers will meet with various groups during employee and student orientation, residential life meetings, speak to academic classes, and many other groups throughout the year providing information about security procedures and how to report incidents.

- Report to safety and security strangers who behave suspiciously.
- Don't hesitate to call the police or safety and security when confronted.
- Keep your apartment or residence room locked.
- Walk in groups of two at night.
- When parking, remove valuables from view and lock your vehicle.
- Engrave your valuables with your license number and record the serial numbers.
- Do not leave personal property unattended.
- Make copies of credit cards and other valuables in your wallet.
- Write your name and I.D. number in several places in textbooks.
- Report all losses to safety and security and/or the police immediately.
- Stay in control. Substance abuse puts you at risk.
- Take photos or video of property and retain copy in safe place.

University Policy on Criminal Issues

If any SBU student is arrested by law enforcement, immediate suspension from any and all University activities, practices and events will be imposed until the University exonerates the student. As outlined in SBU's Student Handbook, discipline is intended to uphold University standards, promote personal responsibility and be educative in redirecting student behavior. All students who choose not to abide by student conduct policies are subject to disciplinary action.

Sexual Assault Policy

In the event of a sexual assault, the victim should be aware of the following procedures:

1. Report the incident to the following:
 - a. Bolivar Police; 345 South Main Avenue; 417-326-5298
 - b. A victim that is a student should inform the dean of students; Goodson Student Union; 417-328-1885 (A member of the residence life staff may serve as a liaison for a student/victim residing in a residence hall). Employees should inform one of the following designated reporting officials: president, provost, vice president for administration, dean of students, athletic director, or director of safety and security.
 - c. A victim at the Mountain View Center should notify the Mountain View Police at 417-934-2525. In addition, the center director should be notified.
 - d. A victim at the Salem Center should notify the Salem Police at 573-729-4242. In addition, the center director should be notified.
 - e. A victim at the Springfield Center should notify the Springfield Police at 417-864-1810. In addition, the center director or building coordinator should be notified.
2. Seek medical assistance (student health center: 417-328-1888) (Ambulance: 417-326-7000) (Citizen's Memorial Hospital Emergency Room: 417-326-0301)
3. Consider the importance of preserving evidence
4. Seek counseling on or off campus (SBU Counseling Center: 417-328-1736)
5. Consider pressing charges
6. University officials will cooperate with local officials
7. If the accused is a student, university disciplinary measures may also be taken at the appropriate time with both the accused and the accuser informed of the outcome.
8. Consider requesting changes regarding academic and living situations. Changes will be made if requests are received that may be reasonably accommodated. Requests for changes should be addressed to the dean of students.
9. The accuser and accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a disciplinary proceeding.
10. Both the accuser and the accused shall be informed of the outcome of any institutional disciplinary proceeding brought alleging a sex offense (the institution's final determination and any sanction against the accused).
11. Refer to the student guidelines and expectation section of the handbook to learn about discipline and sanctions related to sexual assault.

Emergency Response Notification

Southwest Baptist University has an Emergency Management Plan for incidents affecting the campus beyond proportions that be managed by normal operating procedures. The president or provost may declare a state of emergency by which the plan will be activated. The vice president of administration or designee serves as the overall emergency director during any major emergency or disaster. SBU will notify the campus community of an emergency situation through use of the University's mass notification service, the local media, or other communication channels as deemed appropriate once an emergency situation has been verified by security or law enforcement authorities. The university public information officer is responsible for disseminating information to the campus and the surrounding community.

The University conducts regular fire and tornado drills in all campus dorms, as well as table top exercises and panel discussions of many other emergencies. The SBU Alert system is tested annually with a select group.

All students and employees are encouraged to sign up for the SBU Alert E2Campus Notification system. This is the primary means of mass communication during emergencies.



Missing Student Notification Policy

In compliance with the Missing Student Procedures 20 USC 1092 (j) (Section 488 of the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008), it is the policy of Southwest Baptist University (SBU) student life and safety and security to investigate any report of a missing student who resides on-campus at SBU. This policy, with its accompanying procedures, establishes a framework for cooperation among members of the university community aimed at locating and assisting students who are reported missing.

A student shall be deemed missing when he or she is reported absent from the university for more than 24 hours without any known reason. All reports of missing students shall be directed to SBU safety and security which shall investigate each report and make a determination whether the student is missing in accordance with this policy.

Each student living in an on-campus student housing facility has the option to identify an individual to be contacted by the university not later than 24 hours after the time that the student is determined missing in accordance with official notification procedures established by SBU.

Each student living in an on-campus student housing facility has the option to register confidential contact information. Only authorized campus officials and law enforcement officers in furtherance of a missing person investigation may have access to this information.

Each student over the age of 18 has the option of opting out of the Missing Student Policy as per the Missing Student Procedures 20 USC 1092 (j) (Section 488 of the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008), through signing a waiver on the Missing Student Policy Form.

If a missing student is under 18 years of age, and not an emancipated individual, the university is required to notify a custodial parent or guardian of the missing student not later than 24 hours after the determination by safety and security that the student is missing.

SBU's safety and security will also notify the Bolivar Police Department no later than 24 hours after it determines that the student is missing, even if a student has not registered a contact person.

If safety and security has been notified and makes a determination that a student who is the subject of a missing person report has been missing for more than 24 hours and has not returned to the campus, the institution will initiate the emergency contact procedures in accordance with the student's designation.

The dean of students shall have the responsibility to make the provisions of this policy and the procedures set forth below available to students.

Notification Procedure

1. Any report of a missing student, from whatever source, should immediately be directed to SBU's safety and security.
2. When a student is reported missing, safety and security shall:
 - a. Initiate an investigation to determine the validity of the missing person report;
 - b. Contact the dean of students;
 - c. Make a determination as to the status of the missing student;
 - d. Notify Bolivar City Police or other appropriate law enforcement agencies within 24 hours after determining that the student is missing.
3. When contacted by safety and security, the dean of students shall:
 - a. Notify the director of residence life and the university's president's office;
 - b. If, during an investigation of an official report, safety and security determines that the identified student is missing, the dean of students will notify the individual's recognized emergency contact person within 24 hours of making the determination that the student is missing;
 - c. If the missing student is under the age of 18, and not an emancipated individual, attempts to notify will be made to the student's custodial parent or guardian as contained in the records of the University within 24 hours of the determination that the student is missing.
4. The dean of students shall initiate whatever action he or she deems appropriate under the circumstances in the best interest of the missing student.

Student Contact Information

Students residing on-campus shall be given the opportunity to identify and register a confidential contact person or persons to be notified in the case that the student is determined to be missing. Only authorized campus officials and law enforcement officers in furtherance of a missing person investigation may have access to this information. If a resident is under 18 years of age, and not an emancipated individual, the custodial parent or guardian must be the contact person.

Students residing on-campus will have the opportunity to complete the Contact Information Form when they move into campus housing. This form must be completed at the beginning of each term. It is the responsibility of the student to update any changes to contact information.

Fire Safety Report

The Higher Education Opportunity Act (Public Law 110-315) became law in August, 2008, requiring all United States academic institutions to produce an annual fire safety report outlining fire safety practices, standards, and all fire-related on-campus statistics related to student housing. The following public disclosure report details all information required by this law as it relates to Southwest Baptist University.



SBU buildings are equipped with over 300 fire extinguishers. Most are ABC powder extinguishers like the one shown.

On-Campus Housing Fire Safety Equipment

Southwest Baptist University has equipped all campus housing with fire extinguishers and smoke detectors. In addition, all traditional housing (dorms) are monitored 24/7/365 by an outside agency. Casebolt Apartments is also equipped with a sprinkler system in addition to the other fire safety equipment.

Fire extinguishers located in hallways are checked monthly, extinguishers located in rooms or apartments are checked quarterly. Smoke detectors and emergency lights are checked annually. Sprinkler systems are checked on an annual basis as well. Requests for service, repair, or a check of fire safety equipment should be made to the physical plant at 417-328-1550.

Fire drills are conducted each semester by Resident Directors.

University Policy on Electrical Devices & Open Flames

The possession of candles, candle warmers, incense, fireworks, firearms, flammable items, or any other open flame apparatus are prohibited. Halogen lamps, heating units, hot plates are not allowed as well. Power surge protector strips must be purchased and have a self-contained circuit breaker.

Southwest Baptist University is a smoke-free campus.

Plans for Future Improvements in Fire Safety

The safety and security department, together with physical plant and residence life, monitors, analyses, and makes recommendations for safety in campus housing. At this time no projects are pending for advancements in fire safety of residence halls.

Fire Evacuation Procedures

Be prepared for fires. Know the location of the fire extinguisher, pull station, exits, and evacuation routes in your area. In the event of a fire:

- Immediately sound the alarm and/or evacuate the area/building. Notify the fire department by calling 911.
- Notify safety and security by calling 417-328-1556 or 417-328-8733.
- Do not attempt to extinguish the fire unless it is safe to do so. Do not risk personal harm.
- When evacuating; it may be necessary to crawl on hands and knees to avoid smoke. The safest air is generally 1-2 feet above the floor. If trapped inside, call for help, open a window and notify those outside. Seal off the door and air vents if possible.
- Once outside, do not reenter the building until cleared to do so by fire department. Assemble at the designated area. Account for all persons known to have been inside the building.

All buildings on campus are equipped with emergency maps showing evacuation routes.

Memorandum of Understanding With Law Enforcement

SBU Safety & Security is in the process of establishing a formal written Memorandum of Understanding with the Bolivar Police Department. Although there is not a formal document at this time, SBU Safety and Security cooperates fully in all investigations by law enforcement officials occurring on campus property and the contiguous area.

There is no memorandum of understanding at the Mountain View, Salem, or Springfield Campuses. SBU will also cooperate with investigations on these campuses.

University Policy on Illegal Drugs

The purchase or unlawful manufacture, use, possession, dispensing or distribution of illegal narcotics, hallucinogenic, amphetamines, sports enhancement or controlled substances (as defined by Missouri statutes) or controlled medications without a doctor's prescription or non-prescription hallucinatory drugs (e.g., K2 and Spice) or hosting gatherings where such substances are used, is prohibited.

In addition, student agrees that the University reserves the right to require a student to undergo a drug screening analysis. A drug screening analysis may occur when, at the University's discretion, there is reasonable suspicion that the University's policy on illegal drugs is or has been violated. Reasonable suspicion includes any act, factor or information which may be indicative of potential violation of the University's policy on illegal drugs, including, but not limited to:

1. Reported information of violation of the University's policy on illegal drugs;
2. Unexplainable incoherent behavior;
3. Repeated tardiness or absenteeism from class;
4. Drug-related odors on person, clothing, or equipment;
5. Information of affiliation with others believed to have violated the University's policy on illegal drugs;
6. Possession of drug paraphernalia;
7. Previous positive drug screen results;
8. Being cited for or convicted of substance abuse violations by University or municipal authorities;
9. Observable phenomena, such as direct observation of substance abuse or physical symptoms or manifestations of being impaired due to substance abuse;
10. Reported substance abuse or use from any source.

Students – those requiring drug screenings and who test positive for drugs – will be responsible for the cost of the screening. The test will be conducted at a time chosen by the University. Failure to take the test when scheduled, refusal, attempts to elude or attempts to alter a drug screening will be interpreted as evidence of illicit drug usage and will result in disciplinary action.

University Sanctions for Violation of Policy on Illegal Drugs

Students who violate the University policy on illegal drugs are subject to termination of student status. Dismissed students who are allowed to return will be subject to random drug screening throughout their remaining attendance.

In addition to any sanctions that may be imposed on a student for violating the University's policy on illegal drugs, any student employed in the work study program or through campus employment will be terminated.

As a condition of accepting employment as a work study student, a student does hereby agree to abide by the above statement and should the student be convicted of any criminal drug statute occurring in the workplace, the student will notify the University's personnel office in writing in five days.

Drug Free Schools and Communities Act

The University is required by the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act to adopt and implement a program to prevent the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol by students and employees. Every student shall receive a copy of the program annually as printed in the SBU Student Handbook. Additional copies of the handbook may be obtained in the office of student life. Questions concerning the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act may be directed to the dean of students, who is designated by the University to coordinate the institution's efforts to comply with the act.

University Alcohol Policy

Southwest Baptist University takes a position of abstinence, whether on or off campus, regarding the issue of alcohol. The student will be subject to disciplinary action if behavior is found to be inconsistent with the stated position of the University. The University alcohol policy prohibits consumption, possession or distribution of alcoholic beverages on or off campus. It is unacceptable for any person to be under the influence of alcohol while attending SBU. (Students in such condition may seek help from University officials but are still subject to disciplinary action.)

University Sanctions for Alcohol Policy Violation

Students who fail to abide by the University's alcohol policy are subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination of student status. At the discretion of the University, the status of Dismissal with Suspended Imposition of Sentence may be applied to first-time offenses. Students placed on this status are referred to an approved counselor for assessment. Students must follow all recommendations and are financially responsible for all services. Additional sanctions and educational requirements may be specified, depending upon the situation. If there is a failure to comply with all specified guidelines and stipulated deadlines, or if there is another class C violation contained within the student's disciplinary file, the resulting consequence may be the termination of student status. A second alcohol-related offense will result in the immediate termination of student status.

Notwithstanding the above paragraph, no student shall be subject to discipline for entering alcohol counseling, evaluation or treatment provided that the alcohol abuse counseling is undertaken at the student's initiative and is not undertaken as a result of an incident that is reasonably likely to subject the student to discipline. Participation in an alcohol program may not be used as an excuse for continued violation of the University's alcohol policy. *(Board of Trustees approved and adopted on October 19, 2009)*

Drug and Alcohol Counseling Treatment or Rehabilitation Programs

The counseling center provides confidential counseling and will make referrals for assessment and / or treatment. The University will review the alcohol program biennially to determine its effectiveness and will implement changes if they are needed and ensure that the sanctions are consistently enforced.

Crime Statistics

The Clery Act requires all colleges and universities that participate in federal financial aid programs to keep and disclose information about crime on and near their respective campuses. Compliance is monitored by the United States Department of Education, which can impose civil penalties, up to \$27,500 per violation, against institutions for each infraction and can suspend institutions from participating in federal student financial aid programs.

Hate Crime Statistics

The Clery Act requires a separate report of all hate crimes statistics that manifest evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the perpetrator's bias or the perpetrator perceived the person to be in one of the protected group categories.

The crimes required to be reported include Murder, Negligent Manslaughter, Forcible Sex Offenses, Non-forcible Sex Offenses, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Motor Vehicle Theft, Arson, Larceny-Theft, Simple Assault, Intimidation, Destruction, Damage, or Vandalism of Property, or any other crime involving bodily injury.

There are six protected group categories that are reportable under the Clery Act. They are: Race, Gender, Religion, Sexual Orientation, Ethnicity and Disability.

The department of safety and security have received no reports of hate crimes on any of its campuses.

Crime Statistics Definitions

For the purposes of this report, crime statistics were gathered using the following definitions as required by the Clery Act. Definitions of the crime categories are listed in the same order as shown on the crime statistics. Sex offenses are compiled using the NIBRS edition of the UCR. Theft statistics are not required by the Clery Act but are included in this report.

Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter: The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Negligent Manslaughter: The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Forcible Sex Offenses: Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

Non-forcible Sex Offenses: Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse. (Includes ONLY incest and Statutory Rape)

Robbery: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by a means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

Burglary: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony, breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny, housebreaking, safecracking, and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned acts.

Motor Vehicle Theft: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned, including joyriding.)

Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Theft: The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

Arrests and Referrals: Under the Clery Act institutions must also report arrests and referrals for disciplinary action for liquor law violations, drug law violations, and illegal weapons possession. These statistics are counted per person, not per incident.

- **Liquor Law Violations:** The violation of state or local laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness.
- **Drug Abuse Violations:** Violations of laws prohibiting the production, distribution and/or use of certain controlled substances and the equipment or devices utilized in their preparation and/or use. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance.
- **Weapon Law Violations:** The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices or other deadly weapons.

Crime Statistic Definitions Continued

Hate Crimes: In addition to any of the crimes above, the following acts are now reportable as Hate Crimes under the Clery Act, when motivated by prejudice on account of race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, or disability.

- **Larceny-Theft:** The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.
- **Simple Assault:** An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.
- **Intimidation:** To unlawfully place another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.
- **Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property (Except "Arson"):** To willfully or maliciously destroy, damage, deface, or otherwise injure real or personal property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control of it.

Locations: Under the Clery Act, institutions are required to report separately, crimes in four categories: On Campus, Residential Facilities, Non-Campus Property, and Public Property.

On Campus: Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution of higher education within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls; and property within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or other retail vendor).

Residential Facilities: Only Crimes that occur within campus housing. Statistics are also counted for On Campus.

Non-Campus Property: Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization recognized by the institution; and any building or property (other than a branch campus) owned or controlled by an institution of higher education that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

Public Property: all public property that is within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution, such as a sidewalk, a street, other thoroughfare, or parking facility, and is adjacent to a facility owned or controlled by the institution if the facility is used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to the institution's educational purposes.

Detailed Residential Facilities Descriptions

Beasley Hall is a four story building with a capacity of 194 (female) residents. There are two students per room and an adjoining bath between each suite of two rooms. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

Casebolt Apartments is a two story apartment style dormitory. Each apartment accommodates four students for a total occupancy 56 (female) residents. Each apartment is fully furnished with two bedrooms, one full bathroom, kitchen and living unit. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located in the kitchen of each apartment and centrally in the hallways. The structure is fully equipped with fire sprinkler system and a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

College Street Duplex is a single story structure featuring 2 apartments with a total capacity of 4 (male) residents. Each apartment includes 2 bedrooms, bathroom, kitchen, and living room. The duplex is equipped with smoke detectors and fire extinguishers.

Craig House is a single story structure that accommodates 6 (female) residents. The house includes a full-sized living, dining room and kitchen including a study room, four bedrooms, and two baths. The house is equipped with smoke detectors and fire extinguishers.

Gott Hall is a three story building with a capacity of 72 (male) residents. There are two residents per room, with large privacy baths located centrally on each floor. Gott has an adjoining lobby shared also by Woody Hall. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

Landen Hall is a three story building with a capacity of 198 (male) residents. There are two students per room and an adjoining bath between each suite of two rooms. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

Leslie Hall is a three story building with a capacity of 198 (female) residents. There are two students per room and an adjoining bath between each suite of two rooms. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

Little House is a two story structure that accommodates 4 (male) residents. The house includes a full-sized living, dining room and kitchen, bedrooms, and baths. The house is equipped with smoke detectors and fire extinguishers.

Maupin Hall is a three story building with a capacity of 72 (male) residents. There are two residents per room, with large privacy baths located centrally on each floor. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

Memorial Hall is a three story building with a capacity of 92 (female) residents. There are two residents per room, with large privacy baths located centrally on each floor. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

Meyer Hall is a two story building with a capacity of 48 (male) residents. There are two students per room with a bath in each room. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

Plaster Hall is a two story building with a capacity of 64 (male) residents. There are two students per room with a bath in each room. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.

Roseman Apartments are comprised of 2 three story apartment buildings with a total capacity of 32 residents. Each apartment unit accommodates four students and is fully furnished with two full sized bedrooms, two full bathrooms, kitchen and living unit, and a washer and dryer unit. All apartments are equipped with smoke detectors and fire extinguishers.

Woody Hall is a three story building with a capacity of 72 (female) residents. There are two residents per room, with large privacy baths located centrally on each floor. Woody has an adjoining lobby shared also by Gott Hall. Each room is equipped with smoke detectors. Fire extinguishers are located centrally in the hallways. The dorm is equipped with a fire alarm system that is monitored 24/7 by an outside agency.
